BEACONS Of Light Introducing Families of Parishes

he Archdiocese of Cincinnati has taken another step forward in the restructuring of parish life with the establishment of sixty Families of Parishes. Each Family of Parishes is shepherded by one pastor and two or three parochial vicars to assist him. The Family of Parishes connected with Holy Trinity Church includes Emmanuel Church, St. Joseph Church, Precious Blood Church, St. Rita Church, and St. Paul Church.

Due to several personnel situations within the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, it was decided that our new Family of Parishes will not be joined under a single pastor until July 1, 2023. Fr. Angelo will remain pastor of the three downtown parishes and Fr. Tony Fortman is pastor of the three northwest parishes in our Family of Parishes.

During this year, Fr. Angelo and Fr. Tony will work together on Phase 1 of the planning process

designed by the Archdiocese. The primary focus of Phase 1 is to build relationships among the parishioners of our six parishes and among our staff members. We will assemble an inventory of the activities of each of the parishes, our sacramental life, outreach ministry, and stewardship opportunities, a snapshot of the life and culture of each parish. This will be used to guide our discernment in finding areas in which we can collaborate with one another to strengthen the voice of the Catholic Community in the Dayton area.


There are five phases to the Beacons of Light process with the completion date due to be accomplished by July of 2027. In the next five years we will walk this journey together and discover the many ways that the Holy Spirit is calling us to create vital and vibrant communities of faith within the Dayton Community.

Please Follow Food Safety Guidelines when Donating Home-Baked Goods to the Bazaar



re you thinking about baking one of your special sweet treats for donation to the bazaar Bake Shoppe? If so, we ask that you follow some easy steps to ensure the safety and well-being of all participants when preparing your items.



- 1. Wash your hands for twenty seconds with soap and hot water.
- 2. Sanitize your food preparation area and utensils by using antibacterial spray and rinsing with hot water.
- 3. Wash your hands again, dry well, and wear single-serve gloves.
- 4. Cook all baked goods to an internal temperature of at least 200° to 210°.
- 5. Cool items.
- 6. Wash hands again and wear clean single-serve gloves before packaging.

- 7. Individually wrap items securely.
 - Cookies—two to a bag
 - Brownies—one to a bag
 - Cupcakes—one to bag

Any items to be sold whole, such as pies or cakes, need to be wrapped completely and securely.

8. If possible, label items with ingredients that can be allergens (milk, eggs, wheat, tree nuts, peanuts, soy, sesame). If you are unable to label items, please provide a list of allergens with each recipe group.

ost people would agree that the last few years have been more than a little challenging. To say that people have had a lot to deal with is truly an understatement. Some folks are having trouble coping and may be experiencing anxiety, loss, grief, or depression related to events in both our area and the world.

Sometimes we are left dumbfounded by the behaviors we may witness as people interact with one another. Consider a woman who related that she was treated rudely by a clerk at a favorite store. She tried complimenting the clerk, asked her opinions, but the clerk remained curt and unhelpful. She left fuming. As she drove away she felt a nudge from Jesus—"Do you have any idea what that woman may be coping with in her life?" She realized she didn't and thought of her own off days when she wasn't quite herself. In prayer she asked Jesus to help the clerk deal with whatever might be troubling her.

Many people would likely agree that the world needs to be a bit kinder. Being kind or showing kindness doesn't need to be planned. Being spontaneous with it is fun. Kindness has health benefits: it increases chemicals in the brain that give us a natural high, often referred to as "helper's high." Kindness can reduce levels of free radicals and inflammation in the cardiovascular system, slowing aging. Kindness can also help us connect to others, thus improving relationships. It's a good example to others, inspiring them to be kind as well, creating a ripple effect and you guessed it—more acts of kindness. It was author Norman Vincent Peale who stated, "Joy increases as you give it."

How do we get started being intentionally kind? Certainly, praying for someone is a great way, especially for those who have offended us. Other simple ways include paying for some-

one's coffee, allowing the person behind you to go ahead of you in line, holding the door open for someone, or even sharing a simple, genuine smile. Any of these can change a person's day.

World Kindness Day, an international holiday, is observed on November 13 to promote kindness throughout the world. The 2022 theme is "Be kind whenever possible." Kickstart Kindness is another great resource. It's a wellness program available through the Mayo Clinic (https://www.mayoclinichealthsystem. org/wellness/kindness). You can choose specific ways to commit to making acts of kindness from a list of nearly one hundred activities.

At a time when our world feels out of control and we don't know how to make a difference, perhaps it's not that hard. Maybe all we need to do is to start showing more kindness. Perhaps make it a new year's resolution. A small bit of kindness goes a long way.


